Chairman's Report

In terms of that dreaded word 'silverware' 2018 was a disappointing year for the Club. It is probably more than 40 years since no trophies were won by any of the Junior or Senior Teams although to be strictly accurate all is not quite lost as the Smithson Trophy was carried over to 2019 where we will compete in the semi finals. On the brighter side we reached a significant number of cup finals only to fall at the final hurdle. C'est la vie.

In the NEPL the First Team finished 7th whilst the Second and Third Teams contended almost to the last only to be pipped by Tynemouth and South Northumberland respectively. Our other 3rd teams in the C Division and West Tyne League had constructive seasons and enjoyed some notable victories.

There were some significant individual performances – most notably Ben Mussett broke the second team run scoring record in the NEPL whilst both he and Joe Fletcher scored over 1000 runs.

Overseas professional Jacques Snyman made a huge impression on and off the field and it was a grievous blow when he had to return to South Africa in early July. Four players (Rory Hanley, Mohsin Mukhtar, Luke Mussett and Max Williamson) made their full senior Northumberland debuts and as all four had yet to turn 19 the future looks bright. Philip Nicholson homed in on the all time First Team appearance record which will be a remarkable feat in this day and age.

Director of Cricket and First Team Captain Kyle Coetzer led from the front and has performed wonders in developing the young talent within our Club.

Barry Pearson in his multi-cricketing roles also must be singled out for mention and sincere thanks.

We will be a young side in 2019 as we see developing our own players as clearly the best way forward for cricket in our Club. In a tough competitive environment where 'horse trading' is at a ridiculous level this may require some patience, but your support will be ever welcome by all teams – Senior, Junior or Women's.

Off the field the Club made significant progress. The Tennis Club at the bottom of the ground has been reintegrated into BHCC after a 60 year hiatus and we will endeavour to ensure the game continues to be played at Denton Bank. The Squash Club has a new floor and spruced up changing rooms whilst the shiny new Cricket Scoreboard was purchased with the help of an ECB grant.

A new cooler system for the Bar was purchased and investment in the outfield was financed as a result of the extreme weather that was experienced in the spring and summer.

There remain significant tasks to be carried out, e.g. the Artificial Practice Nets are reaching the end of the road and the Cricket Changing Rooms, Showers and Toilets are in significant need of investment. The Club House will at some stage need a new carpet and there is always the painful topic of ongoing maintenance which is never cheap. But once again, we underperformed at crucial moments and were comfortably beaten.

Benwell Hill Ladies started the Summer 2018 League in a confident mood after a successful campaign in the winter Indoor League that saw them finish as champions. Now in their fourth season in the Northumberland Women's 8 aside Leagues the team had established themselves as worthy participants in the top division. The first match of the season against South North was an interesting affair. The batting was impressive with Emily Whiting starting the season with a half-century, and important contributions from Annie Anderson, Niamh Brennan and Ella Lillico. South North

needed to chase 171. Safe? Not quite, when their number 3 batter, Rachel Foreman, strode onto the pitch and blistered 102 runs from only 48 balls. Fortunately Holly Jordan saved the day for the Hill by taking an amazing catch from Foreman's one slog too many! The remainder of South North gave little resistance giving us the first win of the season by 12 runs.

The next match against Newcastle painted a completely different picture at the Medicals ground. This time it was our batting that was disappointing with only Ella Lillico making a respectable score (30 not out). Facing too many dot balls we totalled a disappointing 67 runs from 20 overs. However, the bowling attack was much more impressive with two wickets a-piece for Niamh, Holly and Emily and Molly Brayson was very economical in her overs. Losing the match by one wicket ended up as a fair result, but one we could improve on. At the end of May we faced Corbridge away. After being put in to bat we had a great start with Annie Anderson confidently handling their bowlers and producing an impressive 83 from 66 balls.

Supported by Molly and Emily meant Corbridge had 130 to chase. However, the warm up, provided by our trainee coach Joe Anderson, paid rewards as we managed to take four of their wickets by catches. Corbridge ended their innings with a respectable 112 runs. Again Annie and Emily made an impressive opening stance with Annie scoring 41 runs and Emily 22. Great batting support from Katie Whiting, Niamh Brennan and Ella Lillico was in vain as we ended the match 6 runs shy of their total. The quality of the league was vastly improved on previous seasons due to the many youngsters coming through the ranks. 8 a-side teams provide big gaps in the field, but greater athleticism by the young girls does help to cover ground.

The next two matches were comfortable affairs against South North and Gateshead Fell. We beat South North by 7 wickets and Gateshead Fell by 62 runs. Niamh Brennan was showing form with the bat this season and achieved her maiden half-century away at Gateshead Fell. Wickets were shared equally by the girls and fielding was proving much more competent than any of the previous seasons.

The Under 15s had a mixed season in 2018, but as ever the important thing is that several players have developed nicely during the course of the year. We finished third in the Northumberland League but failed to qualify from our group in the NEPL competition. Wins over South North, Allendale, Newcastle, Kirkley and Haltwhistle helped to give us momentum in the first part of the season, but a disappointing defeat at

Ponteland set us back where our batting let us down. The season was to hinge on the last two games, where we lost to eventual champions Tynedale in a game in which we were in a good position to go on and win. Tynedale were by far the strongest team in the League so losing was no disgrace but showed to me that we are not too far away and with some composure at the end, could easily have won.

The opening partnership between Ben and Rohan was an important part of our batting line up which did lack some depth at times, with Ben and Haroon being the leading bowlers and were a handful for any batsman. All four players were to play regularly for the seniors during the season and put together some impressive performances.

Looking back now after the season has finished, I think it's fair to reflect that the U13 team had a terrific season. We improved massively throughout the season, recovering from 3 early losses to Tynedale, South North and Sacriston (the best teams we played all season) to a magnificent win against South North (in the longer format NEPL competition) at the end of the season. We finished 4th in the Northumberland

Sunday morning league, winning 4 games (v Ashington, Morpeth, Stocksfield and Newcastle), and 1 of 3 games in the top tier of the NEPL competition.

Batting wise, Ella Lillico, Dylan Newton and Haydon Mustard got most of the runs, all scoring well over 100 runs during the season. Ella and Dylan almost always got us off to a great start, and Haydon's hard hitting in the middle order helped us post 5 scores over 110 during the season.

Bowling wise, wickets were shared around the whole team, but it was great to see all our seamers (Owen Blackburn, Bradley Wilson, Abukar Siddique, Kemitha Mudalige, Ibrahim Tayyab and Dan Ramsey) all bowling a good length and most importantly straight. Our spin bowlers (Sam Rowe and Umar Yousaf) took key wickets during the season with genuine spin bowling and offered control in the middle of the innings. The best bowling figures were from Owen Blackburn who took a magnificent 4 for 2 versus Morpeth.

Wicket keeping duties (so important at this age level) were shared by Haydon and Ella, both are fantastic wicket keepers, and did a great job in keeping our extras down to an absolute minimum, which proved crucial to winning a couple of very tight games.

There were two Player of the year awards. The first went to Ella Lillico, who scored over 684 runs during the season (including 2 x 50s) and 10 catches and 2 stumpings, for the various teams she played for (U13's, County and Benwell Hill ladies). Second went to Haydon Mustard for his superb batting for the u13's, he finished with an average of 30, including 4 times where he had to retire at 30, and a 52 not out (out a team total of 98) v Sacriston.

Thanks to everyone who helped through this most enjoyable season, Dan Ramsey for captaining, and to the parents and family, whether it was scoring, umpiring, offering lifts or just supporting. Roll on 2019, as it promises to be a great season with the majority of the side still eligible to play.

The 2018 season proved to be one of our most successful seasons of recent times - despite still having a relatively young team. A new format was trialled during the season, with the length of the pitch being reduced to 17 yards and the use of a composite ball. This led to a reduced number of wides during the season - but also to Ibrahim Tayyab and Abu Siddique spending most of the season in the U13's - too much pace and bounce - jury out re next season.

On the bowling side, again everybody chipped in with wickets - the outstanding figures coming in our match against Tynemouth with Mayank Reddy taking 4 wickets and Aaron Armstrong getting a 5 wicket haul. Also worth mentioning that both Warren Poxon and Jayam Patel have the clear makings of very good fast bowlers.
